Methodology

These findings are from a proprietary survey conducted by brilliant corners Research & Strategies on behalf of Collective PAC and Run For Something. This is a survey of 800 likely voters of at least 18 years old in expanded battleground states (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Michigan, Minnesota, North Carolina, Nevada, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin). The survey was conducted by phone, using professional interviewers starting on July 2, 2020 and ending on July 6, 2020. The survey's sample was drawn randomly from voter file and geographically stratified for proportional representation. The margin of error is +/- 3.0% percent, with a 95 percent confidence interval. Notably, the margin of error for sub-groups will be higher depending on the size of the sub-group sample and the size of the actual response to any given question.

Four basic ways we should talk about/ frame up the conversation around the need to reform policing

Q63. EQUITY AND INCLUSION: Police officers are human beings just like you and me. They're not perfect but most are committed to protecting and serving. Instead of penalizing entire police departments, we need a process to root out bad cops and invest in quality training programs to make sure that good officers are equipped with the skills they need to serve Black and Brown communities better. This means investing in diversity trainings that root out unconscious bias, and making sure officers reflect the racial and cultural diversity of the communities they serve.

Q59. REACTIVE: No one is above the law, not even police officers. That's why it's time to abolish qualified immunity, which is a current policy that prevents officers from being sued and held accountable for the abuses they commit. Now more than ever, we need tougher laws to weed out the bad apples and make sure police are truly committed to protecting and serving the community.

Q61. REIMAGINE POLICING: Police budgets have increased exponentially throughout the United States. Yet despite the increase in officers and military grade weapons, our communities have not become safer. Research shows that what actually brings peace to communities is safe and affordable housing, well-funded schools, and accessible healthcare for all. It's time we redistribute city budgets so smaller percentages go to policing, and larger amounts are dedicated to ensuring access to basic needs.




The Context

Democrats rate highest on the racial sympathy index followed closely by Independents while Republicans go strongly in the other direction





Likely voters in battleground states are overwhelmingly dissatisfied with the direction of the country









A plurality strongly approve of their local police department's job performance











Down ballot Dems have work to do in order to realize Biden's margin


















